

World History

DESCRIPTION- World History is a semester course which includes the study of the historical development of people, places, and patterns of life from ancient times until the present. While focusing on political and economic history, the standards provide you with a basic knowledge of the cultures of the world through a chronological survey of major civilizations, movements, people, and events in World History. Students will use historical and geographical analysis skills to explore, in-depth, the events, people, and ideas that helped shape the past and how those civilizations and ideas still shape the world today.



INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD - This course will be taught using a variety of instructional strategies and technology resources including direct Instruction, **class discussions**, Discussion elements small group assignments, **think tank** and independent study projects utilizing chrome books, laptops, smart boards, etc.



<u>ASSESSMENTS</u> – Students will be assessed weekly through <u>discussion elements</u> quizzes or tests (formal or informal). Benchmark tests will be scheduled according to the school division calendar. (You will receive notification) <u>Tests will be preannounced; however, quizzes may be given either daily or without prior notice.</u> <u>PAPERS & PROJECTS</u> –Projects will be done individually or in small groups. When the assignment is distributed, the size of the group applicable to the project will be announced.

<u>Missing Assignments</u>- If you have a missing assignment you will follow the instructions according to the <u>Work</u> Assignment log Sheet.



ATTENDANCE – Attendance every day is expected and is essential to your success in this class. You are required to attend all classes and be actively engaged.
