





Dr. Lowe is Dean of the School of Science which includes the following: Atmospheric and Planetary Sciences, Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Communicative Science and Disorders, Computer Science, MARC Program, Marine and Environmental Science, Mathematics, Nanoscience and Physics. Dr. Lowe visited Northwest's NSBEJr., Biology and Chemistry classes in the Media Center.

NASA partnered with Hampton's Department of Atmospheric and Planetary Sciences, they launched Aeronomy in the Mesophere weather satellite, the first mission in the nation to be fully controlled by a Historically Black College/University (HBCU).

The Physics Department began the Hampton University **Proton Therapy Institute**, the world's largest proton therapy cancer treatment facility located on the campus. Scientist receive funding and research awards from the National Science Foundation; the National Institutes of Health; the Department of Defense, The Department of Energy, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the Howard Hughes Medical Institute; the Keck Foundation and other agencies.

Dr. Lowe demonstrated hands on gravity and weight experiments and discussed the Science Departments that he was in charge of at Hampton.


