

The Quilters shared their quilts and the purpose for their creation. One quilt had The Underground Railroad overtures through out the quilt, the creator, Ms. Richardson used the signs from the book, Hidden in Plain View: A Scret Story of Quilts and the Undergound Railroad by Jacqueline L. Tobin and Raymond G. Dobard.

The Art students created squares for their new quilt that represents the theme of "Getting along and world peace." The students will begin to complete the squares and The Heritage Quilters will visit the school again to assist in completing the quilt



Many of the quilts that were shared were different styles, some were traditional while others held messages of hope, celebration of writers, kindship, a President, and The Underground Railroad.


Ms. Richardson explains her secret story of her quilt and how it is related to the Underground Railroad. The students look at old fashioned quilts made in the early 1900's..
