This syllabus is intended to give the student guidance in what may be covered during the year and will be followed as closely as possible. However, the teacher reserves the right to modify, supplement and make changes as the course needs arise.

Course Description:

Students in eighth grade will continue to build on the fourth and fifth grade introductions to North Carolina and the United States by embarking on a more rigorous study of the historical foundations and democratic principles that continue to shape our state and nation.

Course Objectives:

The main focus of the course will be the critical events, personalities, issues, and developments in the state and nation from the Revolutionary Era to contemporary times. Inherent in this study is an analysis of the relationship of geography, events and people to the political, economic, technological, and cultural developments that shaped our existence in North Carolina and the United States over time. Although the major focus is state and national history, efforts should also be made to include a study of local history.

Other required materials:

A two-pocket folder for turning in essays and assignments

A notebook for taking notes in class

A Binder for classwork and homework

Assignments and Grading:

The following is an overview of the major assignments we will undertake this semester and grading policies. Additional assignments or a change to grading policies may be announced at my discretion.

Quizzes: They are designed to be conceptual and to foster *critical thinking*. As such, the quiz questions will draw on the elements and *standards*.

Exams: We will have 4 exams, one at 5weeks, 10 weeks, 15 weeks and the NCFE. These exams are designed to foster *critical thinking*. Like the quizzes, the questions will draw on the elements and *standards*. Like the daily due no, the questions will ask you to investigate a question by employing the elements of reasoning, particularly: assumptions, consequences, context, point of view, and interpretations

Papers: We will produce formal papers. I will provide more detailed handouts on what is needed for the papers. I have attached a holistic grading rubric to the syllabus for your information.

Please note, there is a difference between an "F" and a "zero" on my scale. A "zero" will be given, for example, if you fail to turn in an essay. You may receive an "F" on an essay for a variety of reasons but still receive some points. In short, turning in something is better than nothing (with the exception, of course, of plagiarized work).
