

The Lady Panthers' Volleyball team hit the court hard with nine players this year, finishing up with a big win. Coach Woodley, also the art teacher, stressed the benefits of participating, such as trying something new, improving physical fitness and building a sisterhood. She enjoys seeing the look on the players' faces when they make a point, she said.

"I enjoy seeing all their hard work and efforts pay off and teaching those fundamentals and good sportsmanship," Coach Woodley added.

Outside on the football field, 18 players, led by Coach Bowen, also the behavioral specialist, showed a strong season. The defense allowed 5 points per game on average and the offense averaged 29 points per game, Coach Bowen said. Some big contributors include Xavier Hayward with 16 touchdowns, 765 rushing yards, 27 tackles, 6 sacks, 2 interceptions and 1 touchdown; Cameron Johnson with 47 tackles; and A'daveon Batchelor with 320 rushing yards, 3 touchdowns and 34 tackles.

Coach Bowen gave all credit for the team's success to the Warriors program and Coach Freeman.

"Not only did a vast majority of the players start playing football in the program, but Coach Freeman gave me my first opportunity to be a coach within the program," Coach Bowen said. "I'm forever thankful for the opportunity." And like Coach Woodley, Bowen stressed the importance of participation in sports. "It allows kids to make lasting friendships, develop communication skills, feel a sense of community and learn to respect their teammates and coaches," he said.

School Counselor Tashaunna Hughes explained the Positive **Behavior Intervention Supports** System. The school uses the PBIS System to reward students for good behavior, she said. After each quarter, a PBIS Celebration takes place for students who have exhibited good behavior. Good behavior means students without referrals to the school Principal Linda Cooper, without minor incident reports, and who have not had to complete redirection/refocus time with a teacher. These actions are recorded in the database. Educator's Handbook.

"We like to have celebrations or events for the students to reward them for good behavior," Ms. Hughes said. "It helps to improve behavior of those who may not get to participate in the event this time." A murder mystery event was scheduled by the PBIS Committee and other activities will take place.

Another incentive is putting merits into Educator's Handbook for positive student behavior. In return, students receive panther bucks to use in the panther store every other Friday.

In addition, good behavior is rewarded by receiving the title of Student of the Month for each grade and an Employee of the Month. Two employees are nominated with Ms. Cooper making the final decision, Ms. Hughes said. To choose a Student of the Month, a student is chosen by each grade level, following the criteria provided by Halifax County Schools' Central Office. Students of the Month receive a certificate and are posted on the bulletin board in the hallway and on the school website
